- · using friendly facial expressions, open body language, and polite words


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# Equality vs Equity

## Rule or Law?

The 'law' is a system of rules developed by the government. If you break a law, there can be serious consequences.

A 'rule' can be made by any type of group or individual and can be changed much more easily.

## One Rule for All?

Sometimes rules need to be changed because they prevent someone from accessing an opportunity in the same way as everyone else.

Read the following scenarios and discuss with a partner or in a small group how that rule could be unfair.

How could the rule be changed so it is no longer unfair to some people? Be ready to share your ideas with the rest of the class. Did you all come up with the same ideas?

#### Scenario 1

Your aunty has low vision and uses a guide dog to help her get around the city. She needs to visit the doctor and plans to catch the bus.

She waits at the bus stop but when the bus arrives, the driver says, "No animals allowed." and drives off, leaving her at the bus stop.

As a result, she misses her doctor's appointment.

#### Scenario 2

Your friend, who has diabetes, is running late for school one day and does not have time to have breakfast.

If a person with diabetes feels their blood sugar is getting low, they can get sick so it's important they eat something straight away. Your friend feels faint in class and starts to secretly eat a chocolate bar out of his school bag.

The teacher yells at him and he gets in trouble because the class has a rule of "No eating inside".

## Scenario 3

Your class has been given a homework task to create a brochure. It must be designed on a computer and printed out. There are marks given for your ability to design using a digital device.

Some of your classmates do not have a computer at home so they cannot complete the task. They all receive a mark of O. It is a school rule that everyone completes their homework.

### Scenario 4

Your school's soccer team makes it into the regional final tournament. A few people in your team have not had the time or money to get a new uniform, so you are not all wearing the same socks, shorts and jerseys. The organisers of the tournament say your team cannot take part because the rule is that everyone in the team wears the same uniform.

Your team is disqualified, and you miss the chance to become champions.



Imagine it was your friend or family member who was missing out on an opportunity or being discriminated against. How could you stop this from happening again?

One way is to write a letter to a person in charge.

Write a persuasive letter in the space below explaining what happened, what rule needs to be changed and why.

Suggest a new rule or an exception to a rule for certain people.

If you choose Scenario 1, address your letter to the Minister of Transport.

If you choose **Scenario 2**, address your letter to the class teacher.

If you choose Scenario 3, address your letter to the teacher or principal.

If you choose Scenario 4, address your letter to the tournament organiser.
